


President's Message

Ratification of the 19th Amendment

Amendment XIX – The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any state on account of sex. Suffragists began their organized fight for women's right to vote in 1848. For 72 years, they marched, picketed and lobbied for the right to the ballot. Congress, with Republican majorities in both the House and Senate, proposed the 19th Amendment on June 4, 1919. The following state legislatures, most of which had Republican majorities in one or both chambers, ratified the amendment over the next several months.

Ratification Timeline

- 14. Nebraska (August 2, 1919) Republican majority
- 15. Minnesota (September 8, 1919) Conservative majority in both chambers
- 16. New Hampshire (September 10, 1919) Republican majorities in both chambers
- 17. Utah (September 30, 1919)
- 18. California (November 1, 1919) -Republican majorities in both chambers
- 19. Maine (November 5, 1919) Republican majorities in both chambers
- 20. North Dakota (December 1, 1919) Republican plurality in both chambers
- 21. South Dakota (December 4, 1919) Republican majorities in both chambers
- 22. Colorado (December 15, 1919) Republican majority in state house
- 23. Kentucky (January 6, 1920)
- 24. Rhode Island (January 6, 1920) Republican majorities in both chambers
- 25. Oregon (January 13, 1920) Republican majorities in both chambers
- 26. Indiana (January 16, 1920) Republican majorities in both chambers
- 27. Wyoming (January 27, 1920) Republican majorities in both chambers
- 28. Nevada (February 7, 1920)
- 29. New Jersey (February 9, 1920) Republican majorities in both chambers
- 30. Idaho (February 11, 1920) Republican majorities in both chambers
- 31. Arizona (February 12, 1920)
- 32. New Mexico (February 21, 1920) Republican majorities in both chambers
- 33. Oklahoma (February 28, 1920)
- 34. West Virginia (March 10, 1920, confirmed on September 21, 1920) Republican majorities in both chambers
- 35. Washington (March 22, 1920) Republican majorities in both chambers
- 36. Tennessee (August 18, 1920)

The Florida Legislature symbolically ratified the 19th amendment to the U.S. Constitution, granting women the right to vote, on May 13, 1969. Although Florida was not one of the states that moved to ratify the 19th amendment back in 1919/1920, the state did pass a law granting all residents suffrage in 1921. Senate Concurrent Resolution No.1172 was passed easily by the State House and Senate and was signed by Governor Claude Kirk on May 22nd.
